IV. CIF ITEMS

A. PASSED (28-0-0)

Bylaws 801-803 Coaches, Students, Contributions Revision

The Commissioners are recommending a revision of these bylaws to more accurately reflect today's economy.

801. COACHES AWARD LIMITATIONS

No tournament will be sanctioned if an award of over ~~\$100.00~~ \$250.00 in value is made to coaches.

802. STUDENT AWARD LIMITATIONS

A. A high school student may not receive, from any and all sources, athletic awards for athletic achievement in a given sport totaling more than ~~\$100.00~~ \$250.00 in value for:

(1) Accomplishments in any regular season CIF high school competition event;

NOTE: Typical examples of a "regular season CIF high school competition event" include, but are not limited to, any non-league dual contest, league dual contest and/or individual tournaments held prior to any season-culminating League, Section, Region and/or State Playoff competition.

(2) A recognition award program, such as "Player of the Week"/"Month," for any regular season CIF high school competition.
B. A high school student may not receive, from any and all sources, athletic awards for athletic achievement in a given sport totaling more than ~~\$500.00~~ \$250.00 in value for any post-regular season CIF high school competition or recognition program.

NOTE: For purposes of this bylaw only, "~~post-regular-~~post season CIF high school competition" includes League, Section, Regional and State Playoff competition, and such competition is considered to be one continuous event.

C. The dollar value of an award shall be determined by the following criteria:

(1) The retail price paid by the last purchaser in the acquisition of the award;

(2) If the host school or League purchases the award, the retail price paid by the host school or League;

(3) If the award is donated by another entity, the retail price paid by or cost to that entity, exclusive of engraving.

D. Such award cannot be cash, a gift certificate or merchandise alone. It may be merchandise, badge, medal, plaque, ribbon, picture, certificate or trophy, if it is suitably engraved or designated as an award.

E. In the event a student accepts athletic awards in excess of the respective ~~\$250.00~~ \$100.00 and/or ~~\$500.00~~ \$250.00 value(s) stated above, and he/she or his/her parent(s)/guardian(s)/caregiver does not pay the excess amount(s), the student becomes ineligible for further CIF high school competition and shall be penalized according to Bylaw 213.

(Revised May 2004 Federated Council)

803. CONTRIBUTIONS

A. No entity including, but not limited to, booster clubs, individual or corporate donors, school districts, and leagues, may contribute anything in order to make it possible to give an award exceeding the ~~\$250.00~~ \$100.00 or ~~\$500.00~~ \$250.00 value.

B. Awards exceeding the ~~\$250.00~~ \$100.00 and ~~\$500.00~~ \$250.00 values may not be held and given to the student after the student graduates.

(Approved May 2001 Federated Council)

B. FAILED (0-29-0)

CIF State Football Championship Regional Game

The CIF Football Advisory Committee is recommending adding regional football games, north and south starting in December 2012. The winners of the north and south regional games would then play for the championship at Home Depot Center.

During the discussion with the commissioners they suggested that the concept of some type of revenue sharing of the regional football games be developed as part of the proposal.

As the result of the Federated Council discussion at their November 1, 2010 meeting, this item is being brought back as a first reading at this meeting. This item now includes a recommended revenue sharing with sections for the CIF State Football Championship Bowl games for the regional games only.

First Reading/Discussion: February 4, 2011

Vote: April 29, 2011

(2) The Monday of NFHS Calendar Week 19 for winter sports. For 2011, Nov. 7. For 2012, Nov. 5; and

(3) The Monday of NFHS Calendar Week 32 for spring sports. For 2012, Feb. 6. For 2013, Feb. 4.

NOTE: These dates are inclusive of required/mandated "dead periods" such as Thanksgiving Week, winter break, and section mandated dead periods.

B. Last Contest Date

(1) The last contest date for regular season competition shall be determined by each Section.

(2) For sports culminating in Regional or State championships, Section playoff competition must be completed by the Saturday prior to Regional or State competition.

C. Number of Allowable Contests

Sections shall determine the maximum number of allowable contests. Sections, however, for sports culminating in a Regional or State championship may not set a limit higher than:

Basketball	26	
Cross Country	14	
Football	10	(Sports not listed do not lead to a Regional or State Championship)
Golf	24	
Soccer	26	
Tennis	24	
Track and Field	14	
Volleyball	26	
Wrestling	40	(See Bylaw 3103)

NOTE: The maximum number of allowable contests is in effect for teams during the regular season. The maximum number of allowable contests does not include Section Foundation or Scholarship Games, League, Section, Regional or State championships.

(1) Basketball - One contest for each game.

(2) Golf - Tournaments count as 1 contest per day.

(3) Soccer - One contest for each match.

(4) Tennis - One contest for each match.

(5) Volleyball - Tournaments that do not utilize a best 3 out of 5 format (i.e., best 2 out of 3 or single games to 25) count as 2 contests per day.

D. Scrimmages

A scrimmage is defined as:

(1) An activity involving teams or individual student-athletes from two or more different schools in a CIF-approved sport; AND

(2) Where no score is kept; AND

(3) Where regulation time is not kept; AND

(4) Where no officials are paid; AND

(5) Where substitute rules are set aside; AND

(6) Where coaches may stop play for instructional purposes; AND

(7) Where admission is not charged; AND

(8) Where no score/results are released to the media.

A. Number of Scrimmages

A maximum of two scrimmages per sport are permissible prior to the first interscholastic contest (league or non-league) of the season. Scrimmages shall not count in the teams or individuals maximum number of contests. Scrimmages held after a team's first interscholastic contest shall count as a contest.

Revised: 06.10

D. PASSED (29-0-0)

CIF SoCal Boys and Girls Regional Tennis Championships

This event is being proposed by the Los Angeles Section and will allow the Southern California CIF Sections the same tennis opportunities as the CIF Northern California Sections. The Regional Tournament will be gender neutral as a boys and girls tournament are each being proposed. (Attachment A)

E. PASSED (29-0-0)

Proposal to add golf qualifiers to the state championships

This proposal would increase the number of qualifiers for both boys and girls in the NorCal and SoCal Regionals six (6) to nine(9). (Attachment B)

Rationale:

There are many quality golfers participating as evidenced by the lower scores recorded over the past five years. Also, the margin of score between the #6 individual qualifier and what would have been the #9 individual qualifier is minimal.

F. INFORMATION

North Coast Section proposal to change entrant guidelines in wrestling

Proposal to change team/individual entrant guidelines for post season competition to allow two wrestlers from same team to compete at the same weight class. (DVAL)

There are 14 weight divisions in High School Wrestling. Currently, according to California Interscholastic Federation (CIF) guidelines, each team can enter only one (1) wrestler per weight division in the first individual post season qualifier for the State Championship Series, for a total of fourteen (14) wrestlers per team.

The Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA) rules state:

Individual District General Procedures-Each school is allowed to enter fourteen (14) wrestlers in the First Individual District Tournament with no more than two (2) wrestlers being entered in any one weight class.

I believe the MHSAA model is superior to the CIF model for several reasons:

1. Quality of Competition-Wrestling, when entering the State Championship Series is an individual sport. Team scores and championships are dictated by individuals performances in the individual league, sub-section, section, and state tournaments. The Michigan model allows each team to enter its best 14 wrestlers at their most competitive weight class. Like in track and swimming the best athletes from each team should move on to represent their team at their best event/weight. Ex. In a dual meet competition the best wrestlers on the team can be moved around to fill weight classes and get key match ups. This may mean moving up a weight class or even two to help the team get the win. A 165lb wrestler may do well in a dual at the 189lb class but not be at his most competitive if at this weight for the post season. In California if a team has two competitive 285lb wrestlers or two very competitive 103lb wrestlers only one of these athletes may move on to the post season, often seeing a different weight class on the team filled by a much less competitive (first year) athlete.
2. Safety of the Wrestlers-In terms of safety and the well being of the wrestlers, the Michigan Model encourages wrestlers to compete at their ideal/safest weight class. Wrestlers would not have to cut excessive weight to make a spot on the team for the post season. Wrestlers would not have to move up several weight classes and compete against much larger opponents because that is where they could qualify for their team. With the recent implementation of the body composition analysis, the Michigan model falls in line with looking after the safety of the wrestlers. Ex-1. A team may have two wrestlers who are very competitive at the 103lb class. The better of the two weighs 106lb and cuts down to 103/105lb class for the post season. The second best wrestler, who weighs 98lbs, in our current system, could then be the teams starting 112/114lb wrestler for the post season. This 98lb young man who had been very successful at the 103lb class giving up only a few lbs would be facing in the post season kids who have in many case dropped down from 120-125lbs. The Michigan model offers a safer solution for this young man instead of stepping on the mat against wrestlers 20-25lbs, or 30% heavier. (In all dual meets the 98lb wrestler went 103 and the larger boy went 112). Ex-2. At the start of the season a team has two wrestlers at the HW division who are capable of placing at the State Level. They both weigh 270-280lbs and the body composition states they could both compete at the 215lb class at the end of the season. As workout partners they push each other in practice and the post season lifting weights to get stronger and play football and wrestle. To both be able to compete in the post season for wrestling one of these young men would have to lose nearly 60 lbs, or 22% of their bodyweight, in less than 3 months, especially if the team made the post season football playoffs. (see 2002/2003 De La Salle heavyweights Drazba and Sandie). The Michigan model allows both athletes to wrestle at the HW division without the drastic weight loss and still pursue their football goals.
3. Equity-The Michigan model allows for greater equity in the post season for smaller teams. Teams which may not fill all 14 weight classes, yet have competitive wrestlers in the same weight class would be able to enter more wrestlers in the post season and be better equipped to compete against teams with larger programs. Ex-A school has only 10 wrestlers in its entire wrestling team. Its two best wrestlers are both heavyweights capable of placing at the section tournament. This team currently could only field nine (9) wrestlers for the post season, leaving at least one competitive wrestler out. The Michigan model allows this team to enter all ten (10) wrestlers in the post season giving them more scoring opportunities as a team versus teams with larger programs.

Points of interest:

- A. Does not effect or change team scoring. Every team has the same opportunity to enter fourteen (14) wrestlers in the post season and all fourteen (14) score for the team.
- B. Encourages all wrestlers to stay out and compete based on merit of skills, hard work, and accomplishments. (Athletes, especially heavyweights, will not quit if they can not beat the starter).
- C. Coaches can still use challenge matches for determining post season competitors. These wrestlers can then be entered at their ideal and safest weight, (up to 2 per weight class). Coaches will also be able to take into account a wrestlers accomplishments, tournament record, year in school and many other factors if need be, not just were the athlete fits in the lineup by weight.

Mark Uyle of the MHSAA who I have been in contact with for much of this information stated, "The (wrestling) coaches (in Michigan) have been very pleased with this approach".

F. INFORMATION

Football Mercy Rule

This item had a first reading, but during the discussion the Federated Council asked for the proposal to be edited and all language not part of the proposal be deleted. It is being brought back as a first reading item.

This agenda item is being presented for statewide adoption, for both regular and post-season contests, starting with the 2011 season. The proposed rule is in accordance with NFHS Football Rules 3-1-2 and 3-1-3.

1. During the 1st half, by mutual agreement of the opposing coaches and the referee, a “*running clock*” may be used if the point differential between the two teams reaches 35 or more;
2. If at the start of the second half or at any time during the second half, the point differential is 35 or more points, a running clock shall be used for the remainder of the contest;
3. Once the “*running clock*” is in effect during the 2nd half, it shall remain in effect for the balance of the contest, even if the team that is behind subsequently scores to make the deficit less than 35 points;
4. The “*running clock*” will be administered as follows:
 - A. The game clock will start with the snap or legal touch of a free kick on the first play following the establishment of the pertinent point differential, and continue to run uninterrupted when:
 - A 1st down is awarded to either team, including following a change of possession;
 - The ball or runner is out-of-bounds;
 - A legal or illegal forward pass is incomplete;
 - A play results in a touchback;
 - An inadvertent whistle occurs;
 - During all penalty enforcements.
 - B. The game clock shall be stopped for:
 - The end of a period;
 - A score (including touchdown; try; field goal; safety);
 - The free kick following a fair catch or awarded fair catch;
 - A charged team time-out;
 - A coach-referee conference;
 - An official’s time-out (injury; equipment; 1st down measurement; other, as required);
 - C. Following a stoppage for any reason in B. above, the game clock will start when the ball is next:
 - Marked ready-for-play; or
 - Legally touched on the free kick following a score, a fair catch or awarded fair catch

A. REMOVED FROM AGENDA

Review of Bylaw 507H Classifications/Divisions

507H Classifications/Divisions

- a) NCS/Les Schwab Tires Championship Series Events shall be divided into classifications or divisions as determined by the NCS Board of Managers and/or the State CIF Federated Council.
- b) **Criteria for establishing divisions:**
 1. **Criteria for divisional alignment:**
 - Balance all divisions by the number of schools participating
 - A minimum of 25 boys and girls teams in each division
 2. Sports with six (6) divisions (currently girls’ volleyball, boys’/girls’ basketball, baseball, softball) all schools will be placed in the same division for the identified sports.
 3. If a schools enrollment **increases or decreases by 15% or more** of the division break, that school will be moved **up or down a division** the following school year. **(Note: If a school is moved to a different division, causing a division to drop below the minimum of 25 schools, then the divisions will need to be adjusted to balance each division.)**

NOTE: Divisions will be reevaluated at every alignment cycle. (every 4 years)

If a school enrollment **increases or decreases by less than 15%** of the division break, that school may remain in the current division until the next realignment cycle (every 4 years)
- c) Schools will be allowed to change classification/division only, in the sports of baseball, football, soccer, softball, team tennis and water polo for the purpose of post-season competition consistent with the applicable criteria. Schools may petition in accordance with the time schedule set by the NCS Board of Managers, to a baseball, football, soccer, softball and/or water polo (if classification competition is conducted) classification of greater enrollment. The deadline for petitions would be consistent with other sports of the same season. Schools who petition up in classification/division will remain at that classification/division during the current year and future years. Schools who petition up in

classification/division may move back to their actual classification/division in accordance with the time schedule set by the NCS Board of Managers.

- Note: Some additional criteria for changing classification/division may be included under the specific sports in this handbook.
- d) In the sports of football, soccer, team tennis, wrestling, baseball and softball, where classifications/divisions are determined by enrollment in the previous year's grades 9-12 TOTAL data, and any other "classification/division" sports that are subsequently added, NCS staff shall automatically adjust to TOTAL enrollment break points to ensure that schools from different classifications/divisions have approximately the same chance of participating in the NCS playoffs based on established bracket sizes. NCS staff shall take historical "petitioning up" in classification/division into consideration when determining break points. Any enrollment breaks listed under specific sports are subject to change based on the above potential adjustments. Each sport championship bulletin will list the current year's enrollment breaks.
(Board of Managers 1/21/05)

- e) If a school of larger classification/division participates in a league with schools of a smaller classification/division that school must compete in its actual classification/division during post-season competition in team sports.

- f) *Any school who participates in the NCS Championship contest, finishing first in the respective classification or division, for three years in succession will automatically be moved to the next higher classification or division the following school year of competition. The school may return to the actual classification or division of enrollment after at least one year of competition at the higher classification or division once the school does not participate in the NCS Championship contest, finishing first.*

Sports and General Rulings 100H new language**

100H – Amendment of Bylaws

- A. These following bylaws may be amended at any regular meeting of the NCS Board of Managers by a majority vote of those present.
 - 1. The succeeding July 1st has been established as the implementation date for all modifications of these bylaws unless a specific implementation date is stated in the action.

VI. NEW BUSINESS

A. PASSED (20-4-4) IMMEDIATE IMPLEMENTATION

Motion to add the following language to Sports & General Rulings Bylaw 25.405H Area Entries:

Any competitor or relay team that is disqualified from an event during the league qualifying meet may not move on to the next level of competition in that event. A league may only submit qualified entries to advance to the next level of competition regardless even if they don't fill their allotted number of entries. *Rule 4 Sec. 5 Art.1 NFHS Track and Field Rule Book 2011*

Rationale: The track management committee feels that additional language is needed for each league to come in compliance with the NFHS Rule 4 Sec. 4 Art. 1. We have had relay teams allowed to advance to the next level of competition after being disqualified in the qualifying meet.

**B. PASSED (29-0-0) ALSO WOULD LIKE PROPOSAL SENT TO CIF AT THE STATE LEVEL
CIF Check List for Accreditation**

Addition-11. Any ejection of a player and/or coach from a contest must be reported to the administrator of that school within 12 hours of the ejection. The officials association must provide the name of the individual, circumstances of the ejection, and the reason for the ejection. Failure to report to the school administrator may result in the loss of the official's association accreditation. *-Required for accreditation*

Rationale:

- Currently the sole responsibility of reporting an ejection falls upon the coach.
- Most schools have walk on coaches who may not be responsible for notifying their school Administrator.
- A coach may be very upset during the contest and not get the correct information upon leaving the contest
- Requiring the coach and the officials association to report an ejection to the site administrator more adequately supports accurate reporting and a lesser chance of the students being penalized by the inaction of a coach who does not report or is confused by the call of the officials.

AD/BOG (27 schools) VOTE: Unanimous support

The Hayward Area Athletic League would like to suggest some changes and adjustments to the process for seeding the North Coast Section playoffs. The change to establish a knowledgeable committee for each sport a few years ago was a welcome adjustment to some of the issues that came up with the old process. Now that we have lived with the process for a few years we have a few adjustments we would like to suggest.

While football is a special seeding issue due to the fact that you are looking at only 10 games, all sports that require seeding may want to use the suggestions below that might cover some of the issues that arise when trying to seed the playoffs when there is a disparity in head to head and common opponents. Many sports can look outside their league for up to half of their games seeking like opponents both in size and competitive equity. Due to the size of many of our leagues, football may only be able to have 2 or 3 games where they can seek like opponents, then are restricted to league games that may not give a true indication of the strength of that particular team.

Our Suggestions:

- 1) **Clarify the criteria used to do the seeding.** How heavily is strength of schedule looked at compared to win/loss record? Is a loss to a ranked team better than a win to a non-ranked? Is the committee looking at scores at all? This is contrary to the sportsmanship standards of NCS. What outside resources are being used, MaxPreps, Cal High Sports rankings, etc.. While Max Preps merely reports the scores, Cal High ranks based on scores of games, which can give a skewed impression of the wins and losses. Is finish in league looked at? Are newspaper rankings used, which are often based in part on the scores of games. Are biases being addressed within the committee for members coming from various leagues or conferences? How many games/contests etc.. realistically can this committee see many games or contests outside of their area? Are coaches rankings taken into consideration, and is there space for coaches to rank ALL teams that qualify, not just the top 10?
- 2) **Provide a one to two sentence justification for the Rankings.** The committee should be able to prepare a brief statement as to why schools are placed in their seeding position. If a scribe is assigned to keep notes during the process, this may be able to be done in a timely manner.
- 3) **Allow for the opportunity for further clarification after the seeding is done.** Schools that got overlooked need to have some feedback as to what they could do to improve for the following season. It is not clear to the outsiders how a team that is 6-3-1, can lose out to a team that is 4-6. These schools need to have somewhere to go, someone to talk to in order to get some information for future scheduling. Perhaps this can be the duty of the scribe, or the member from NCS who is overseeing the meeting.

For all other sports:

We feel it is important to clarify the criteria for all sports, and allow for follow up to understand seeding. All processes should include regular evaluation, not only from the committee themselves but from the schools their serve.

BYLAWS THIS pertains to;

511H At-Large Team Selection Committee

- a) The system of at-large team selection and seeding incorporates the following concepts:
- 1) One committee in each of the following sports; football, volleyball, water polo, basketball, golf, lacrosse, softball, soccer, team tennis and baseball will be selected to select at-large teams and develop brackets.
 - 2) Committee members will sit on committees making selections of teams for which they had no direct or indirect ties.
 - 3) Coaches' shall submit a written application with complete information by the established sport deadline to be considered for entrance and/or seeding to the NCS/Les Schwab Tires Championships.
 - 4) The same procedure of assigning panel representatives and conducting meetings is to be used in all classifications/divisions.
- b) Conduct of an NCS At-Large Team Selection or Seeding Committee Meeting.
The format of the meeting shall be:
- 1) Welcome - (announced starting time of meeting)
 - 2) Roll Call
 - 3) Review criteria - (refer to 515 H).
 - 4) Committee will review applications and identify league champions/automatic qualifiers. (Refer to 504H)
 - 5) Committee will determine number of at-large teams to be selected. Review any pre-determined criteria. (See specific sport information in this handbook.)
 - 5) Committee will select at-large teams and seed and bracket the teams for competition purposes.
 - 6) NCS Selection Committee may increase the team sports brackets, when there are qualified teams applying for NCS Championships. Any increase in the brackets size will not cause the NCS Championship in each respective sport to exceed the posted championship date.

512H League Responsibility for At-Large and Seeding Personnel

Leagues are responsible for providing at-large and seeding nominations. If a person assigned by the league is unable to attend, that person must notify the league commissioner who is responsible for finding a replacement.

PENALTY FOR VIOLATION: The league will be fined \$150 for each unfilled at-large & seeding representative who does not arrive in time to participate as the respective league's at-large & seeding representative.

(Board of Managers 10/21/05)

514H Criteria for At-Large Selection

A. The criteria for selection of at-large teams for NCS/Les Schwab Tires Championship Series in all appropriate sports shall be a balance between:

- 1) Record over-all
 - a. League/Place co-champion
League Playoff
 - b. Non-league (pre-season/tournament/other)
- 2) Strength of Schedule

Record against top 3 opponents in football; top 6 opponents in all other sports.

 - a. Record against teams in the same division/classification
List your most significant victories/defeats
 - b. Record against teams in a higher division/classification
List your most significant victories/defeats
 - c. Head-to-head against teams which have qualified or are being considered.
 - d. Record against common opponents
 - e. Coaches Ranking

B. Additional definition and criteria for Volleyball at-large selection.

- 1) Record - Tournament play - a minimum of 2 games won is required to record a match as a win. Two games lost counts as a match lost and two games won counts as a win. Splits (one game won and one game lost) does not count as a contest won or lost. A one game win or loss is not counted in the criteria for seeding or at-large. All games counted must be played to 25 points with the exception of the fifth game of a five game match and the winning team must have won two of three or three of five games.

D. **DISCUSSION**
Guidelines for determining playable fields in football (DVAL)

Who makes the decision if a field is unplayable or not? When should the decision be made? Maybe not right before the game, but sometime during the hours before. With so many all weather stadiums, if we know the field is bad why can't the game be moved.

Applicable bylaw:

18.608H Inclement Weather

The game management is solely responsible for determining whether or not a game will be started. After it is underway, the decision as to whether or not it should be suspended rests solely with the game officials.

Rain: A game can be played even though it rains prior to, or during a contest. Some of the factors that must be considered as far as postponing a game because of rain are as follows:

- 1) Has the rain made the field unplayable?
- 2) If a game is being played in a junior college or community owned stadium, will the stadium manager permit the game to be played in the event of rain?
- 3) Do weather conditions and the forecast for the following day justify postponing the contest to the next afternoon or night?

Fog: When fog has been present during the week or is predicted for the weekend, the game management will check out the stadium the night before the scheduled game and keep in close check with weather forecasters. If conditions warrant, a decision to postpone the game should be made before the gates are opened. If a game is scheduled for Friday night, a postponement to Saturday afternoon or evening would be in order.

If fog conditions are uncertain, and it is the best judgment of management to attempt to play the game, the following precautions must be taken:

- 1) Rain checks must be prepared and given to each person as he or she enters the stadium.
- 2) Prior arrangements should be confirmed as to the time, date and location of the game in the event it is to be postponed.
- 3) The public address announcer should keep the spectators constantly informed as follows:
 - a. If one half of the game is completed and then subsequently called because of unplayable conditions, it will be an official contest and the score will stand.
 - b. If the game is called before one half has been played, it will not be an official game. The contest will then be replayed in its entirety on the date and at the time and place previously agreed upon prior to the game.

Motion to adopt a waiver process of the age requirement in football.

18.102H Age Requirement (CIF 1900)

A student shall not be allowed to participate in an interscholastic varsity football contest or scrimmage until the student has reached his/her fifteenth birthday. The varsity football team of a three or four-year high school is the unlimited team, commonly called the first team. A student under 15 years of age may participate in an interscholastic non-varsity football contest or scrimmage, but the student may not participate in an interscholastic contest or scrimmage against the varsity team of another school. If a school has only one football team, it could be designated as the junior varsity, provided it does not compete against other varsity teams and provided it has received league and CIF section approval as a junior varsity team.

Criteria for the waiver of the age requirement shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

- A. *Participant must be at least 14 years of age;*
- B. *A letter from a licensed medical practitioner that the student is able to compete at the varsity level;*
- C. *A signed consent statement from the parent(s)/guardian(s)/caregiver, allowing participation at the varsity level;*

- D. A statement from the head coach that the student-athlete has the physical and mental maturity to compete at the varsity level;*
- E. A statement of compliance must be forwarded by the principal to the North Coast Section office verifying that all required documentation has been completed and is on file in the appropriate school office.*

~~Note: North Coast Section member schools have chosen not to adopt the criteria to waive the 15-year-old requirement to play varsity football. Therefore, no waiver is available for NCS schools.~~

PENALTY FOR VIOLATION: The penalty for use of an ineligible participant is found in the NCS Student Eligibility Bylaw 219. (Board of Managers 5/1/06)

No admission is currently charged for NorCal Regional Tennis so we do not intend to charge admission for this event. Therefore, other than the financial support from USTA Southern California to offset many of the expenses associated with the event, SoCal Regional Tennis will not generate revenue.

5. Please demonstrate using the both costs in #4 above and anticipated event revenue how this event may be sustained economically over many years.

This event will run at a deficit, even with the financial support of the USTA – Southern California office. NorCal tennis and NorCal, SoCal, and State Golf currently run at a deficit due to the lack of ticket revenue. However, the events provide positive experiences for the student-athletes and coaches involved in these sports.

6. Is the current CIF State Office staff capable of managing this event?

Qualifying Participation Criterion for a Regional Championship:

1. Do 50% of all CIF schools participate in the sport in the same ?

Yes. Each of the four Southern California Sections offers girls tennis in the fall and boys tennis in the spring.

Other Questions:

1. How will this event benefit participating schools and students?

This event will put the CIF Southern California Tennis in line with CIF Northern California Tennis. The Regional Tournament will provide more notoriety and positive publicity to the sport and has the potential to one day develop into a CIF State Championship.

2. Do the proposed dates conflict with state mandated testing?

No.

3. Does the event cause additional loss of instructional time? If so, has any thought been given to mitigating this loss (Saturdays, evenings, vacation time)?

The event will be on Tuesday, Friday and Saturday with up to two days of lost instructional time (50% of schools will host on Tuesday). Travel is not to be done during the school day the day prior to the event.

4. If the proposal is for a sport that is played now in more than one season in the state, what dates are selected and why?

Not applicable. Girls' tennis is in the fall season throughout the state and boys' tennis is in the spring season throughout the state.

5. How, specifically, will this event be a demonstration of the values of participation in high school athletics? In choosing teams or individuals for an event, is there any criterion such as demonstration of respect, sportsmanship, citizenship, achievement through effort and cooperation, full compliance to CIF code of ethics, rules, regulations, guidelines, etc.?

The event will follow all rules and procedures of the California Interscholastic Federation. All participants will follow the guidelines of "Pursuing Victory with Honor" The various Sections will nominate their schools for participation in the tournament. It will be the Sections responsibility to only nominate those schools that have followed all of these procedures, rules and guidelines throughout the season of play.

6. Will the proposed event lend itself to a partnership between the State CIF and a CIF Section? If so, the nature of the partnership must be detailed. What are the duties and responsibilities of the State and Section entities? If there is to be a risk/profit sharing, what are the proposed financial details? If resources, other than financial, are to be used as part of a partnership, what are the anticipated resources? Any proposal that considers a Section/State partnership should consider whether or not an event should be rotated, upon request, among Sections.

In regards to financial responsibility there will be no partnership between the State CIF and any of the CIF sections. - The 16 teams will be allotted to the section as shown below:

Los Angeles City Section:	2 Teams
San Diego Section:	2 Teams
Southern Section:	8 Teams
- The 15th and 16th teams will be at-large selections open only to the Central, Los Angeles, and San Diego Sections.
- Seeding will take place on the Sunday prior to the start of the tournament.

Format:

The player strength ladder must represent both singles and doubles players strength on team roster starting with highest strength player as number one to lowest strength player listed last. This player strength ladder will be enforced for all matches.

Each team will consist of four (4) singles players and three (3) doubles teams. Players may only play one event (singles or doubles). Each school shall decide which event a player will enter. The number one singles player must be ranked higher on the team individual player strength ladder (ladder) than the number two player. The number two singles player must be ranked higher than the number three player. The number three singles players must be ranked higher than the number four singles player.

The ranking of the doubles teams will be determined by the sum of the ladder positions of each team. The #1 doubles team will be the team with the lowest sum, the #2 team with the next lowest sum, and the #3 team with the highest sum. If the sum of any of the ladder positions for two or three of the teams is equal, then the highest ranked individual player shall play on the higher ranked doubles team.

Lineups may change from one match to the next. If a player in the lineup is unable to play, a substitution is allowed, providing the ladder rules stated above are met. No player can appear in the lineup unless he is listed on the ladder. Moving players with the intent of gaining an advantage is not permitted and shall subject the team to default by the tournament directors.

The player strength ladder submitted for Regional Championships shall be the same player strength ladder as used for the Sections Championship.

Scoring:

For the first two rounds and the Semifinals, the scoring will be two out of three sets, with no-add-scoring (12-point tie-breaker system). This rule will be in effect, up to the final championship matches. The final championship matches shall be two out of three sets with add-scoring (12-point tie-breaker).

Players are responsible for returning the tennis balls and reporting match results to the Tournament Director immediately after their matches.

REMINDER FOR SOFTBALL

Per NFHS rule changes, the softball pitching distance increased to 43 feet for all levels of play this year.

GIRLS' WRESTLING

This year marked the first-ever NCS/OS qualifier for the CIF State Girls' Wrestling Championships. The tournament saw an increase of competitors from 113 (2010) to 132 (2011), all of which were NCS participants, as no Oakland Section wrestlers were entered into the event. The venue for the NCS championship was changed from J.F. Kennedy-Fremont H.S. (MVAL) to Newark Memorial H.S. (MVAL), same site for the boys. Four NCS qualifiers advanced to State, including two state champions in 154's Katie Burdick (NMHS) and 235's Jillian Jenkins (Albany).

REMINDER FOR WRESTLING FORMS

Multiple schools showed up to the championship without this required form. Please remind your schools to have this form filled out; otherwise they could be subject to disqualification.
